

Taxing and Spending in Delaware

Tax Freedom Day is the day of the calendar year when Americans have finally earned enough money to pay all of their federal, state and local taxes. In 2009, Delawareans worked 101 days, from January 1 to April 11, to pay their tax bill, giving Delaware the 30th latest Tax Freedom Day in the United States.

Any ranking of a state's tax burden should also account for the local burden. This is especially true in Delaware with its heavy reliance on the state to provide many services that are delivered at the local level in other states.

Policymakers consistently cite Delaware as a low tax state. Indeed, compared to other states in the region and many across the nation, we are. However, it's all relative; simply having lower taxes than surrounding states does not equate to giving an "OK" to tax increases. While combining state and local taxes is necessary when discussing the tax burden, knowing the state portion alone is helpful for various taxes.

The data shows that for many taxes, Delaware is in the middle of the pack. Looking at more data, we can see that for lottery revenue as a percentage of own-source revenue, Delaware ranks 3rd highest in the nation,

garnering 4.15%. As policymakers look to head off a budget shortfall in fiscal year 2011, they should keep in mind Delaware's reliance on exporting taxes. If legislators continue raising excise and income taxes, Delaware will drift away from being the low tax state in the region.

A recent column by former State Finance Secretary, David Singleton, noted that, "Delawareans should know how our spending stacks up and decide whether they want to continue supporting such a high level of spending." He continued, "if we're going to continue spending at this level, Delawareans should insist that it produce national models of excellence – top quality, efficiently managed public services" (*The News Journal*, 8/2/09).

Mr. Singleton makes a great point about demanding excellence. Unfortunately, Delaware is clearly not a model of excellence in a multitude of areas including corrections, environment, public education, welfare and Medicaid – all things that Singleton notes Delaware as among the nation's highest spenders.

The Delaware Economic Forecasting Advisory Committee (DEFAC) and policymakers agree that next year will bring another difficult budget balancing act. Fortunately, the efforts to improve government operations through better management and efficiencies are ongoing. We hope that they bear fruit.
